Re: Acknowledgements for the NOMA Honor in Design Excellence Award, Won by AARRIS Architects at the NOMA Award Gala at the National Conference in ST. Louis Missouri, Saturday October 10, 2009

Dear Mr. Lewis,

I am writing this letter on behalf of AARRIS Architects and our design consultants as an expression of the deep joy we have experienced for having won the prestigious NOMA Honor in Design Excellence Award for the completion of the African Burial Ground National Monument (ABGNM). The AARRIS design team believes that the power of the project is generated by the sacrifices of the ancestors for which it stands. Our intent was to honor the lives of the free and enslaved Africans who were laid to rest at this site, and I believe receiving this award is evidence that, by the grace of God, we have achieved our objective.

I would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and express my deepest gratitude to all of those who were involved in the design process including all of those who voted for our scheme early in the GSA competition selection process to win the commission in 2004. I must begin my acknowledgements with my esteemed colleague Rodney Leon for his conceptualization, ingenuity and leadership on our journey to materialize ABGNM.

We are indebted to the former Mayor David Dinkins who was active Mayor of New York City at the time and now Governor David Patterson (who was then Senator David Patterson) for their roles in stopping the construction of the annex to the General Services Administration (GSA) building that was originally planned for this lot. We commend the GSA and the National Parks Services for their contribution towards creating a steering committee of community activists who together with the GSA and the NPS lead the way towards getting Historical Landmark status for the lot and then its status as a National Monument.

Our greatest admiration goes to Dr. Michael Blakeley and his staff at Howard University for the exemplary work they have completed in unearthing the data that help us to understand more in the lives of the men, women, children and babies that were buried at this site.
